Thanks to the vision of then Disney CEO Michael Eisner, Life Began To Imitate Art!

The NHL Ducks were born, & then came the building of Anaheim ICE – along with Disney GOALS program!













Dave Wilk, who had founded the pioneering ICE HOCKEY IN HARLEM program in NYC, was recruited by Eisner to launch a community based program to involve underserved youth in the greater Anaheim area.

Anaheim ICE arena opened In 1995 and the Disney GOALS program was off and running (skating).






The old Anaheim Redevelopment Authority conveyed a 3 acre parcel of prime land in downtown Anaheim to GOALS in '94. This remains a major GOALS asset.

GOALS continues a ground lease with the Anaheim Ducks organization which results in a major 500 hour ice time "payment" to GOALS annually!

Tens of thousands of youngsters have learned skating & hockey through GOALS over the decades since.

GOALS



Led by Wilk, GOALS embarked on a massive decade long facility and program expansion which ontinues to this day!

From 2008 to 2018 GOALS built multiple acres of facilities, expanded to 3 cities and many Communities and grew from 500 to 1,500 youth involved annually.

GOALS launched major new athletics, learning and community service efforts!













GOALS assumed an impromptu role as a community development enterprise. Many abandoned acres in north central Anaheim were brought under the control of the CBO and the "GOALSLand" complex took form over a 5 year period!





By 2017 many new GOALS venues were opened for community children.

The original Dreamscape (2010) was doubled to include Dreamscape Too with hockey, soccer, tennis and basketball venues.



GOALS geographic footprint grew to 3 cities, 6 school districts and many more communities. GOALS also opened Anaheim's first free charter school in 2015.









GOALS—A Better Community

GOALS plans multiple site improvements surrounding the recently restored GOALS-ABC Clubhouse facility. These improvements will be phased in throughout 2019 and enable diverse, healthy, safe and community oriented FREE activities for all!





Note 1: The old pool pump house will be rebuilt as a small coach check in/observation post.

Note 2: The filled in former pool will be used short term as a small beach soccer pitch. The Ducks Rink may be sited over a portion of this area.

Note 3: Tennis Legends court will feature a dark green sport court and will host clinics and games of tennis and other racquet sports

Note 4: The "Net Sports" area will be upgraded with additional sand and used for volleyball, soccer and other beach type sports

Note 5: The Anaheim Ducks who supported the GOALS ABC Clubhouse creation, have also committed to developing a substantial Ducks community rink—which will be used for skating, hockey, futsal, and various other healthy group activities.

Note 6: The ABC Outdoor Amphitheatre will seat up to 75 people for specials events, picnics, performances and outdoor education sessions. A small raised deck will accent the eastern edge of the amphtheatre.

Note 7: The large GOALS Activity Deck will provide an outdoor study space, art studio and general enrichment area, complementing the indoor space of the clubhouse.

Note 8: Three Tetherball play areas will be established along tetherball alley

Other clubhouse perimeter features will include a front "Promendade" featuring a landscape walkway with river rock accents, a children's garden along the south (main entrance) outdoor wing of the clubhouse, and a handball wall and court. All perimeter work is expected to be completed by the end of 2019 and periodic open houses will be hosted to showcase continued community progress as this becomes a better and better community!



GOALS has long prized service to help others as a principal focus to encourage both personal and civic improvement.

There are multiple portals to enter GOALS and a number of those can be found through the service branches within the overall program. These include:

GOALS Cadets - Summer of Service which is the largest and most sustained service module of GOALS annually.

GOALS Cadets - Success Through Service, a referral program built around service learning and experiences designed in partnership with the Anaheim Police Department

GOALS Cadets - Saturdays of Service, which features the fusion of multiple partnering volunteer service entities along with varied GOALS participants.

GOALS Cadets - Service in the Sequoias, planned as a way to support Camp Pythian and the US Forest Service

GOALS-GRIP, a service-learning opportunity geared at elementary school youngsters on a referral basis in 8 (projected) target zones in Anaheim.

All of these branches have service options applied through 4 basic programmatic options which include GOALS Homebase facility projects, Special Sports helping the disabled, CityPride improving municipal parks, COMMUNITY and Expeditions to help others across EXPEDITIONS the greater region.





GOALS coaches & volunteer GOALS Cadets have been visiting in the "ABC" community of Anaheim Monday—Thursday mornings throughout the summer of 2018 to help launch a major, *multi-year* community improvement project. This is known as the **GOALS—A Better Community initiative** or "ABC". ABC is also the name generally used to describe this underserved part of Anaheim which has in its center, three streets called Alameda, Brownwood, and Catalina—hence "ABC".

GOALS Cadets is a voluntary community service program within the larger NOT FOR PROFIT GOALS program, which involves over 1,500 Anaheim and other county youth during each year.

The GOALS Cadets are lead by GOALS Coaches who will help direct both physical improvements and who will also coach fun, free sports activities for children in the community. Additionally, GOALS will be bussing children to



our main facility called "GOALSLand" in central Anaheim as well as on many trips to the Anaheim ICE arena for indoor ice skating and hockey. Everything is being provided **FREE** to area children!

Our initial plan for 2018 will be to clean and improve the common land and clubhouse areas which are



currently in terrible and even dangerous condition. Then we will introduce FREE athletic and after school education programs plus summer camps! With YOUR help we may be able to get the old pool clubhouse open as soon as Christmas of 2018! We're making a difference already—day by day. 





Number Of Dead Rises To 50 In New Zealand Mass Shooting

Police say the number of people dead in the mass shooting that occurred at two mosques in Christchurch, New Zealand, has risen to 50.

"As of last night we were able to take all of the victims from both of those scenes, and in doing so we have further located another victim," New Zealand Police Commissioner Mike Bush said in a news conference from the city of Wellington on Sunday.

Another 50 people were injured in the shootings. Of those injured, 36 people are hospitalized, with two in critical condition.

Bush said that heightened security around mosques in New Zealand will continue until authorities determine there is no longer a threat.

The 28-year-old suspected gunman appeared in court on Saturday and was charged with murder. Bush said he will appear in New Zealand's High Court in early April. Authorities are considering additional charges for the suspect, including charges under the country's Terrorism Suppression Act.

The suspect had a New Zealand firearms license that he obtained in 2017. Police are still working to identify what type of weapon was used, but Bush said, "It's quite obvious" that he modified his firearm.

The suspect was apprehended in his car by two police officers. Bush said he believes the officers prevented further deaths "and risked their lives doing so."

Bush also clarified information surrounding the arrests of three other individuals. He said that two people were apprehended in a vehicle near the scene of the shootings and that a firearm was seized from them. The woman from the vehicle was released without charge; the man has been charged with firearm offenses.

Police also arrested an 18-year-old man as a result of their preliminary investigation into the attack. He will appear in court on Monday. The man "went to ... assist children in the area to get them safely but did decide to arm [himself], which is not the right approach," Bush said.

Bush said that at this point, none of those three other individuals arrested thus far appears to have been involved with the shooting.

"At this moment, only one person has been charged in relation to these attacks," Bush said. "I will not be saying anything conclusive until we are absolutely convinced as to how many people were involved. But we hope to be able to give that advice over the next few days."

A list of <u>victims' names</u> has been created with the help of senior religious leaders and has been shared with families. Police said the list was compiled to give some certainty to the families of the victims. Victims have included young children and people from at least a half-dozen countries.

"This is not a formal list, and we will be unable to share exact details of victims until they have been formally identified," Bush said.

Bodies of the victims have not yet been released to families because police are still working to determine cause of death for each victim. But Bush said police are aware of the Muslim faith's requirement for a prompt burial.

"We are so aware of the cultural and religious needs, so we are doing that as quickly and as sensitively as possible," Bush said.

Although authorities have not released an official list of victims, a <u>list of missing people</u> has been published on New Zealand's Red Cross website. It includes people from Bangladesh, Pakistan, Jordan, India and Syria, among other countries.

Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern said many of those "directly affected by this shooting may have been migrants to New Zealand" or even refugees.

Nazi-Saluting Teens Provoke Outrage In California After Photos Flood Internet

A series of photos featuring a group of teenagers crowded around a swastika made of red plastic cups – laughing, toasting and Sieg Heiling over the Nazi symbol – is shaking swaths of predominantly white and affluentcommunities across Orange County, Calif., where at least some of the teens are enrolled in high school.

The pictures were taken at a recent party and posted to Twitter and Snapchat over the weekend, going viral and ultimately capturing the attention of local law enforcement and Newport-Mesa Unified School District officials which have both launched investigations into the students' activities.

"While these actions did not occur on any school campus or school function, we condemn all acts of anti-Semitism and hate in all their forms," the district told NPR in an emailed statement.

The statement followed letter sent to parents on Sunday confirming some students "created inappropriate anti-semitic symbols."

"Many times off-campus student actions, under the care of their parents and guardians, negatively impact our educational environment. We take our responsibility to students seriously when they are in our care and when their actions outside our care impact our learning environment," officials said, adding that the district does not "shy away from this responsibility."

Adriana Angulo, a spokesperson for the district, told NPR officials are cooperating with Costa Mesa and Newport Beach Police Departments in an investigation to determine a course of action. Students are suspected of underage drinking.

Most of the teenage boys and girls in the photo are hamming it up for the camera, celebrating as nearly all raise as their right hand to deliver what looks like the Nazi salute. A few can be seen holding their phones and at least one girl appears to be taking a picture of the swastika made up of about 100 red plastic cups that look as though they've been set up to play a white supremacist version of the popular drinking game, beer pong.

Several outraged Instagram and Twitter users have been spreading screen grabs of the images online, adding what they say are the names of the individuals involved — an act that is drawing some criticism from people who argue the students are too young to have their identities published.

Charlene Metoyer, president of the school board, told *The Mercury News* she was "simply devastated."

"As a school board, we're not only concerned by the underage drinking, but also the mental health of the students who participated in this horrendous act and all their fellow students who will be affected by it. This is appalling to not just our Jewish student community, but to all of us who care about human rights."

Keegan Hankes, a senior researcher at the Southern Poverty Law Center Intelligence Project, told NPR the number of hate groups are on the rise in Orange County. Over the last year, the organization has identified eight new groups, including some that "have made a calculated attempt to bring younger people into the movement."

According to Hankes there has been a national shift among white supremacist and neo-Nazi groups. "It wasn't that long ago that we were having conversations about whether the movement was going to age out. You would go to conferences and it would be an audience full of white men in their late 30s and up. Now, you go to the same conferences and they're sold out and the average age has dropped by 20 years," Hankes explained.

Groups like Patriot Front, a spin-off of Vanguard America that was founded by Thomas Rousseau when he was 19 years old, and Identity Europa, aggressively try to recruit teens on high school and college campuses, Hankes said. He noted that the Internet and social media outlets have proved invaluable to recruitment efforts by these groups and hastened the spread of their racist ideologies.

The Anti-Defamation League noted the largest single-year increase in anti-Semitic activity in 2017, since it began tracking incidents in 1979. As NPR's Emily Sullivan reported, that year "K-12 schools surpassed public areas as the locations with the highest number of anti-Semitic incidents."

"There were 457 incidents in K-12 schools: a dramatic increase of 94 percent from the previous year. On college campuses, there were 204 incidents: an 89 percent increase," Sullivan reported.

In November, a group of Wisconsin students created a viral prom photo in which a few dozen boys posed in the Nazi salute.

A student at Newport Harbor High School told the *Los Angeles Times* she was not necessarily surprised by the photos featuring the swastika or the Nazi salute. Jocelyn Navarro told the paper most students self-segregate into groups of people with similar ethnic backgrounds. Additionally, she said she's witnessed instances of casual racism on campus. Meanwhile, Josdel Hernandez said the some members of the junior class recently wrapped up a lesson on the Holocaust as part of the history curriculum, adding that it's unlikely the students in the photos were unaware of any offense the Nazi pose might cause.

"They showed us graphic videos of the concentration camps," she said. "It's not like our teachers need to show us anymore about the Holocaust. They knew what it means."

School district leaders have scheduled two community meetings — Monday and Thursday — to discuss the offensive social media posts.

"This is a time to come together to ensure that we have a common understanding of good values and moral judgments to instill upon our youth," the district said.
